John 3:16

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12 Empty

When the women went to the tomb on the Sunday morning they were shocked to see that the stone had been moved and the tomb was empty. Jesus was not there because he had risen from the dead! Jesus had defeated death and sin. An empty egg is not disappointing - it is the best part of the Easter story! It reminds us that Jesus is alive.



He is Risen! Matthew 28:1-10

The angel said to the women, "Don't be afraid. I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here! He has risen, just as he said he would! Come and see the place where he was lying."

Palm Branch 1

Whilst it was usual for people to walk everywhere in Jesus' time, Kings would often ride on donkeys or horses when they entered a city. The people would line the streets to watch and would lay their coats or branches down on the road for the horse to walk on. The people were so excited when Jesus entered Jerusalem. They waved branches and shouted 'Hosanna!', which means save us.

The Triumphant Entry Mark 1:1-11

They brought the colt to Jesus, threw their coats over it and he sat on it. Many people spread their coats on the road. Others spread branches they had cut in the fields. Those in front and those in back shouted, "Hosanna! "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!"

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Coins

Judas, one of Jesus' disciples agreed to hand Jesus over to the chief priests for a mere 30 pieces of silver. Jesus takes the opportunity to speak to his disciples at the Last Supper about what was about to happen and that one of them would in fact, betray him.



Rock 11

After Jesus was placed in the tomb, the entrance was covered with a large rock. This rock would have in fact been more like a large boulder and extremely heavy, requiring several men to move it. No one could get in. No one could get out. But just to be sure, the authorities put a royal seal on the stone and placed soldiers on duty to guard the tomb, so that it could not be taken away.

Judas agrees to betray Jesus Matthew 26:17-30

Judas was the one who was going to hand him over. He said, "Surely you don't mean me, Teacher, do you?" Jesus answered, "You have said so."

A Stone covers the Tomb Entry Matthew 27:62-66

"Take some guards with you," Pilate answered. "Go. Make the tomb as secure as you can." So they went and made the tomb secure. They put a royal seal on the stone and placed some guards on duty.

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10 Cloth

According to Jewish law, dead bodies could not be left exposed overnight. Some of Jesus' followers including a man named Joseph of Arimathea requested Jesus' body be released to them so they could place his body in a tomb. They wrapped his body in clean linen cloths. It was customary for sweet-smelling spices to be wrapped with the cloth for special people, which they did for Jesus.

Cup

The night before he was killed, Jesus sat with his disciples in an upper room in Jerusalem and celebrated a passover meal together. After they'd eaten, Jesus took bread, broke it and said this was like his body, which was about to be broken as a sacrifice for the whole world. He then did the same with some wine, explaining it was like his blood, which was going to be poured out for the sins of many.

Jesus is Buried Matthew 27:57-61 Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth. He placed it in his own new tomb that he had cut out of the rock.

The Last Supper Matthew 26:26-30

While they were eating, Jesus took bread. He gave thanks and broke it. He handed it to his disciples and said, "Take this and eat it. This is my body."

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4 Praying Hands

After they had eaten, Jesus and his disciples went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. Jesus left his disciples to keep watch while he went to pray to God alone. Through his prayers, it is clear that Jesus is fully human *(with anguish about his impending death)* and fully God *(willing and able to be the ultimate sacrifice for all).*



Spear

The soldiers had been ordered to break the legs of those on the cross to speed up their death. However, because Jesus was already dead, they decided to pierce the side of his chest. The trauma placed on Jesus' body had caused fluid to gather in the sack around his heart and around his lungs, which is why blood and water flowed out separately. Jesus' death was real and painful.

The Garden of Gethsemane Mark 14:32-42

"Abba, Father," he said, "everything is possible for you. Take this cup of suffering away from me. But let what you want be done, not what I want."

The soldiers pierce Jesus' side John 19:33-34

But when they came to Jesus, they saw that he was already dead. So they did not break his legs. Instead, one of the soldiers stuck his spear into Jesus' side. Right away, blood and water flowed out.

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Rooster

After Jesus was nailed to the cross, the soldiers took his clothes and divided them amongst themselves. The inner robe that Jesus wore was made of one piece of cloth and thus significantly more valuable. The soldiers sat and gambled to see who would get to keep this prized piece of clothing.



After Jesus was arrested, Peter followed and sat in the courtyard to see what was going to happen to Jesus. After being spotted, Peter denies he is one of the disciples or that he in fact knows Jesus at all. In that moment, the disciple that Jesus described would be the 'rock of the church', suddenly puts his own safety ahead of his faith in the Messiah.

Soldiers gamble for Jesus' robes

John 19:23-24

When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes. They divided them into four parts. Each soldier got one part. All that was left was Jesus' long, inner robe.."Let's not tear it....let's cast lots to see who will get it."

Peter Denies Jesus Matthew 26:69-75

Right away a rooster crowed. 75 Then Peter remembered what Jesus had said. "The rooster will crow," Jesus had told him. "Before it does, you will say three times that you don't know me."

Dice

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6 Crown Thorns

The soldiers had heard Jesus' claims that he was the King of the Jews. They made fun of him by twisting thorns into a shape of a crown and pressing it down onto his head. They dressed him in a purple robe (the colour fit for royalty) and continued to mock Jesus.



Nails

Crucifixion was one of the cruelest forms of death, used by the Romans for usually the worst criminals. Even though he had done nothing wrong, Jesus was placed on a wooden cross, nails pierced through his hands and feet, and hung until he died.

A crown of thorns is placed on Jesus' head Mark 15:16-20 Then they twisted thorns together to make a crown. They placed it on his head. They began to call out to him, "we honour you, King of the Jews!"

Jesus is nailed to the cross Luke 23:26-43

The soldiers brought him to the place called the Skull. There they nailedJesus to the cross. He hung between two criminals. One was on his right and one was on his left.

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
